Vision



Our vision is that everyone all over the world identify and acknowledge the power of youth to positively influence their societies.

Boundary partners



Our Boundary partners are the participants of the network. They are young peacebuilders between ages 15 and 32, a majority from local levels of society, committed to positively influencing their societies, and connected to an organisation that is committed to the same.

Why?



Our belief is that uniting youth in an organised way is a requirement for efficient policy-making, as this will lead to greater global-level cohesion among youth, increasing their ability to positively influence peace-promoting processes, which is a prerequisite for efficient policy-making.

How?



To accomplish this requires commitment from FUF and from our boundary partners (hereafter the participants), a strong digital infrastructure, strategic partnerships, and stable funding.



The Global Peace Hub Story

To our potential funders, supporters and partners;

The Swedish Development Forum, FUF, started the digital network the Global Peace Hub (GPH) in April 2021.

Lining up with UN Security Council Resolution 2250 on Youth, Peace, and Security (YPS) and Agenda 2030, we believe that global challenges call for global solutions and that youth inclusion in decision-making processes is a prerequisite for sustainable and peaceful societies.

We believe that uniting youth in enriching ways will lead to greater global-level cohesion among youth, increasing their ability to positively influence their societies. Together with youth, we acknowledge the need to strengthen their own brand, allowing them to represent themselves as a positive force for change.

In forming the GPH, we have been striving for diversity; a space accessible to youth of different socioeconomic backgrounds, cultures, gender identities, countries, and levels of society. The diversity of our participants has been

our comparative advantage, along with our global approach to working with the YPS-agenda, our ambition to reach youth at local levels, and our expectation that participants are network co-creators and leaders. At FUF, we do our best to continue expansion in this direction, because indeed, what is a youth network if not formed by, and subsequently made relevant to, youth.

It is all about the long-term

Our vision is that everyone all over the world identifies and acknowledges the power of youth to positively influence a trajectory towards peaceful, democratic, and sustainable societies. There are so many engaged and resourceful candidates all over the world, wanting to contribute to a story like this. It is an ambitious vision, but there really is no other way to go about it.

The GPH today

Fast-forward from 2021 to today; We have developed a solid structure ready for implementation. We have a private, digital platform for communication, we have gone through two rounds of recruitment, we have had several meetings, workshops, and one-on-ones with our culturally and professionally diverse group of 50 global citizens from 35 countries. This has been achieved even though we have had limited funding, issues with network connectivity, and a (naturally) fluctuating commitment from our youth volunteers.

Many of our participants express that the GPH is a personal, enriching, and safe network. A hub to foster intercultural dialogue, deep dive into topics of personal interest, and a place to safely network.

Already, participants report that they have gained new perspectives and knowledge of new opportunities, and we have only built the structure.

I thought peace building was something only for older people, but being part of the GPH has opened my understanding of my role as a young person. Now I know that I can and must be a part of the change that I want to see in my community, and in the world at large.

Where we are headed

The world is changing at a fast pace. To many of us, our planet's development looks grimmer by the day. Yet what we see in the network is steadfast youth from all over world, committed to contributing to positive change. Our planet's unprecedented technological development creates new opportunities that we want to expand with and use to our advantage; enabling young people to come together and mobilise, despite obstacles as limited funding, visa restrictions, pandemics. or political conflict.

Overall, we want to foster a culture of empowerment, self-leadership, humility, and intercultural understanding.

The GPH must be built organically – and different measures will be needed at different times. Now, we are looking to expand and scale up our network, the way we always meant for it to grow. This requires stable funding, a knowledge-intensive steering group to support the participant-led network, solid digital and communications infrastructures, and partnerships with research institutes and other actors of strategic importance.

This is the Global Peace Hub story. This story reflects the hopes and desires of our valued participants. A story like ours contributes to mobilisation, which is key for change. A story like ours recognises youth not only as the future of tomorrow, but as actors to be reckoned with today.

Strategies

Digital Infrastructure

An advanced digital infrastructure to support interactions, collaborations, and project follow-up.

Strengthened network

Through interacting and collaborating, participants learn from each other and gain partnership opportunities with external parties.

Collective skill-building

Through interacting and collaborating, participants learn from each other and gain patnership opportunities with external parties.

Knowledge transfer

Participants apply what they learn in their own contexts creating positive spill-over effects of their network engagement.

Research

Through connecting with research institutions, we contribute to the global knowledge base of youth engagement and inclusion.

Assumptions

- Participants are willing to spend voluntary time on network activities.
 The network is able to reach participants at local levels of society.
- Participants have access to a somewhat stable network connection and a technical device.
 Interacting on the digital platform feels safe and without unnecessary risk.

Short-term outcomes

New knowledge and perspectives

- Participants see themselves as actors of change rather than as receptors of unwanted change.
- As a result of learning from each other, participants change their behaviour which positively affects their interchange.

Strengthened skills and capacities

- Participants become more skilled at self-leadership and more apt at navigating formal and informal societal structures
- Participants gain a profound intercultural understanding from global interactions.

Increased collaboration

- Participants connect each other with opportunities within and outside the
- Participants identify mutual interests and areas for collaboration

Intermediate outcomes

Empowered youth

- Participants gain increased confidence in their influential abilities and share their knowledge in their workspace and/ or their communities, advancing youth perspectives.
- Participants more readily claim the space where they offer their feedback and thoughts.

Increased Influence

Digital infrastructure

- Our digital infrastructure enables broad engagement which leads to increased collaborations.
- Our digital infrastructure supports our participants and their organisations' digital processes

Established collaborations

- Structures for regional and global collaboration have been established and continue to develop.
- Through partnerships, participants and their organisations are professionally supported.

Long-term outcomes

Improved brand

The brand of youth has improved; from perpetrators of violence, youth are considered a force for positive change.

Strong presence

There is a stronger presence of youth organisations world-wide working in peacebuilding.

Equal possibilities

The exposure and experience of global-level collaboration has resulted in more equal possibilities for youth to contribute at globaland intergovernmental levels of society.

Impact

Youth are considered essential to effective policy making and peacebuilding at all levels of society; they actively participate in and influence formal and informal processes of decision-making - at local, national, regional and international levels.
